

Interim Guidance for Long-term Care Facility Reporting of Antigen Test Results November 16, 2020 (replaces version dated October 6, 2020)

Thank you for your continued engagement with COVID-19 testing. The information you provide is key to ensure timely public health actions and helps us have a complete understanding of the status of COVID-19 activity in North Carolina.

This interim guidance provides information on two items:

- Reporting COVID-19 antigen results from your facility to public health, and
- A COVID-19 test portal for reporting aggregate, deidentified COVID-19 test numbers for those facilities that do not report results electronically.

Reporting Antigen Test Results

If your facility is using a **point-of-care antigen test device** for detection of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, this guidance serves as a reminder that providers are required per North Carolina Administrative Code <u>Rule 10A NCAC 41A.0107</u> to report **all results**, positive and negative, of diagnostic testing for SARS-CoV-2. This includes antigen test results.

For facilities that are reporting detailed results through National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN), Electronic Laboratory Reporting (ELR) or COVID-19 Laboratory Data Automation (CLDA) outlined in the guidance for reporting results, please include all Antigen testing in your reporting results. This is the preferred means of reporting COVID-19 test results. If you are reporting via any of these platforms it is not necessary to email your results to NC DHHS.

For long-term care facilities who are not yet reporting detailed data to us through NHSN, ELR or CLDA, please follow this reporting guidance.

- Long-term care facilities are required to report all test results that will not be reported by a laboratory in accordance with this guidance within 24 hours of receiving the test result.
- Long-term care facilities should provide:
 - Aggregate positive and negative test counts through the <u>Electronic COVID-19</u>
 Aggregate Test Reporting (eCATR) process.

AND

 Detailed positives and negatives via <u>secure spreadsheet</u> to NCDHHS. This spreadsheet MUST be submitted securely via email according to the following instructions:

NC DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

- Password protect the spreadsheet using the password provided by the Division of Public Health.
- Label the Subject line: "Confidential Test information".
- Encrypt the email to which the spreadsheet is attached.
- Please email your password protected Excel spreadsheet via encrypted email to LabTeam@dhhs.nc.gov.
- For any staff tested at the facility, personal address and date of birth must be included in the report.

Additional guidance regarding <u>appropriate use of antigen testing</u> is also available on our website. Announcing a new electronic volume reporting portal

In an effort to streamline and simplify the COVID-19 test data collection process, NC DHHS has developed an <u>electronic survey</u> to collect data on all daily COVID-19 testing <u>volumes</u> (positive and negative results) from facilities or laboratories not currently reporting all results through Electronic Laboratory Reporting (ELR) or COVID-19 Lab Data Automation (CLDA). The survey, called "Electronic COVID-19 Aggregate Test Reporting" (eCATR) will be used to collect aggregate daily testing <u>volumes</u> from laboratories and/or point of care (POC) facilities.

Please note:

- This survey does <u>not</u> replace the <u>requirement to submit your detailed positive COVID-19 test</u>
 <u>results using the spreadsheet outlined above</u> to provide information necessary for
 surveillance of COVID-19.
- This survey does <u>not</u> replace the staff testing reporting requirements for nursing homes under <u>Secretarial Order No. 2</u> and <u>Secretarial Order No. 4</u>, which are submitted through the <u>COVID-19 Testing: Nursing Home Reporting Portal.</u>

This aggregate data will ensure we are able to more accurately account for COVID-19 testing and capacities in NC. Our goal is to ease the burden of reporting by streamlining the data collection and reporting process.
