
What's New

The exhibition, which runs through January 25, 2020, showcases 50 original works by Maurice Sendak, the award-winning author and illustrator, most widely known for *Where the Wild Things Are*. The exhibition has been on display in multiple cities in the United States and abroad.

Around the State

SLNC Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped Hosts Bluegrass Musician John Santa at the Governor Morehead School

On December 4, 2019, SLNC's Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped presented The Culture of Bluegrass Music in North Carolina: My life as an accidental bluegrass musician featuring noted bluegrass musician John Santa. The event was held in Raleigh at the Governor Morehead School and the audience of 107 people included Governor Morehead students and LBPH patrons. The program was made possible by funding from the North Carolina Humanities Council, a statewide nonprofit and affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities. The engaging event aligned with Come Hear North Carolina, a celebration of the 2019 Year of Music.

After a welcome from Master of Ceremonies Annie Davis, John Santa traced the evolution of bluegrass music from its early roots into its emergence as a mainstream musical genre. During the musical journey, Mr. Santa demonstrated some of the instruments that played a role in the evolution of bluegrass, including the fiddle, the guitar, the mandolin and the steel guitar.

After a brief question and answer period, Mr. Santa joined bluegrass musicians and LBPH patrons **John and Sandy DeLuca** in performing some classic bluegrass pieces, followed by a contemporary piece composed by John DeLuca on life as a blind person. After the presentation, attendees were given the opportunity to ask further questions of Mr. Santa and to touch and try various instruments.

There are three sections in the State Library:

Government & Heritage Library (GHL)

Provides print and digital information about North Carolina, as well as history, government, genealogy, and statistical research expertise.

Library Development (LD)

Supports libraries throughout the state, through innovative programs and services, to help them meet the needs of their communities.

Library for the Blind & Physically Handicapped (LBPH) Serves blind and physically handicapped readers, through a wide range of books and magazines in print, braille, and audio formats.
