

Evergreen User Interface Updates

NC Cardinal Project staff are implementing a simple-to-use search interface, on top of their online catalog, Evergreen. Cardinal now includes 28 of 58 county library systems, 5 of 12 regional libraries, 3 of 11 municipals, and 1 special library.

N.C. Government & Heritage Library (GHL)


Provides print and digital information about North Carolina, as well as history, government, genealogy, and statistical research expertise.
