





Jen Hanft visited two 11th grade classes at Apex High School on May 22 to talk about information literacy, NCpedia, and the NC Digital Collections.


Library Development Site Visits

N.C. Government & Heritage Library (GHL)


Provides print and digital information about North Carolina, as well as history, government, genealogy, and statistical research expertise.
