What are Micro-credentials?

<i>Micro-credential</i>	<i>Badge</i>
Recognition achieved through demonstrating mastery of a defined skill or competency, including industry-recognized competencies.	Digital or physical representation of a micro-credential, stack, or credential.

Models for Professional Learning

<i>Competency-Based</i>	<i>Time-Based</i>
Learning activities that result in the participants demonstrating evidence of achievement of specified outcomes.	Seat time that adds up to the time requirement for that CEU. [first footnote]

Who is using Micro-credentials?

The following data was gathered via survey sent to all North Carolina LEAs [second footnote] in March 2016. [image: green and white checklist].

Where are Micro-credentials being used?

Why choose Micro-credentials?

- Research show that teachers incorporate these newly acquired skills in their practice.
- Depth of learning is increased as mastery is demonstrated. [third footnote]
- Micro-credentials offer a personalized learning experience through evidence of mastery.
- Teachers demonstrate mastery in many ways, from industry credentials to class badges.
- Teachers who learn these demonstrate a desire to learn even more.
- Micro-credentials formally recognize achievements, often in digital portfolios.
- Earned credentials may be utilized to evaluate candidates for advanced positions.

Use your LMS
