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Addendum: “Raise the Age” Priorities

The Sample County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) seeks to maximize available allocation funding by 1) ensuring the full range of juvenile jurisdiction is addressed with resources along the continuum, 2) addressing priorities of the Raise the Age in the areas of targeted intervention programming for 16-17 year olds, and 3) supporting the work of School Justice Partnerships by identifying programs/gaps in the juvenile justice continuum that will provide intervention programming:
